## **INDIAN SUMMER**

Mitch Epstein has collated a decade of travel to the subcontinent to create a colourscape of extraordinary subcultures and scenes American fine-art photographer Mitch Epstein made eight trips to India between 1978 and 1989 while working on three films with his then-wife, director Mira Nair. Over the course of that time, he shot tens of thousands of photographs, a selection of which, most of them previously unpublished, have now been brought together in a new book: *In India*. The images capture public scenes – such as a crowd of men veiled in neon-pink powder at the Ganpati festival – as

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well as more intimate moments. Together, they reflect India's broad swathe of subcultures and reveal Epstein's position as both "insider and outsider". "I had to be back in America for several decades before I could really see the India I had photographed," writes Epstein in his introduction to the book, "where the stratified facets of society were in continual convergence." **SARA SEMIC** *Mitch Epstein: In India is published by Steidl at \$75*
